49. Confirmation of Minutes - 16 October 2023

RESOLVED that the minutes of the meeting held on 16 October 2023 be confirmed and signed by the Chair as a true record.

50. Declarations of Interest

No declarations of interest were received.

51. Housing Revenue Account Business Plan 2024/54

Purpose of Report

To present Executive with the long-term Housing Revenue Account (HRA) Business Plan for 2024/2054 which introduced the 30-year business plan that set out the Councils intentions for what we wanted to achieve over that period.

Executive was asked to approve the contents of the HRA Business Plan for 2024/2054 and the strategic workstreams that were included in the plan (considered by Housing Scrutiny Sub Committee on 2 November 2023.)

Decision

That the HRA 30 Year Business Plan be approved.

Alternative Options Considered and Rejected

None.

Reason for Decision

Lincoln was a successful city and demand for housing was expected to grow over the life of this business plan. The Council maintained 7,800 homes which represented approximately 20% of the city's total number of domestic homes, and also managed and maintained 1,235 council garages.

All Councils with 200 or more council houses were required to hold a Housing Revenue Account.

Extensive consultation had taken place in collaboration with Lincoln Tenants Panel, Tenants and five member workshops held.

The HRA covered revenue income and expenditure relating to the Council's own housing stock. It was an account ring-fenced from the Council's general fund as

required by the Local Government Act 1989, which specified the items that could be charged and credited to it.

The Council must include all costs and income relating to the Council's landlord role (except in respect of leased accommodation, for households owed a homeless duty, and in respect of accommodation provided other than under Housing Act powers).

The Council had a legal duty to ensure the account remained solvent and to review the account throughout the year.

The HRA Business Plan set out the income and expenditure plans for the delivery of council housing in Lincoln. The Plan and associated budgets would be reviewed and monitored annually. A five-year business plan was reviewed and approved in February 2023. However, it was apparent that a number of strategic workstreams that needed to be included in the plan (i.e. Additional Homes, Decarbonisation, Estate Regeneration) could not be planned for or delivered within a five year timeframe, so the decision was taken to develop a new long-term (30-year) business plan that would allow sufficient time and investment to deliver these long-term goals.

The Housing Revenue Account invested over £30million in Lincoln's economy each year, with much of this spend going to local businesses and residents. These partnerships with local businesses helped to support the growth of a vibrant and resilient economy in the city

The business plan contained proposals to maintain and improve approximately 7,800 homes, whilst also regenerating neighbourhoods and delivering much needed new and refurbished additional homes.

The provision of good quality housing was a fundamental human need. Providing quality accommodation would improve the quality of life for thousands of people across the city and deprivation and inequality would be minimised.

We were working to make our council housing as energy efficient as possible, also using the HRA to drive down our carbon footprint.

Failure for the HRA Business Plan to be approved by Executive would have a detrimental impact on the delivery of housing services in Lincoln.

52. Repairs Policy Update

Purpose of Report

To detail the changes and updates made to the Repairs Policy since its previous review in 2017.

Decision

- 1. That the Repairs Policy be approved and briefing sessions for customer services and housing staff be undertaken to ensure understanding and consistent application.
- 2. That the Council website be updated with access to the policy for our customers.

Alternative Options Considered and Rejected

None.

Reason for Decision

The Repairs Policy had been reviewed and updated by the Housing Repair Service (HRS), the Investment Team, and in consultation with the Lincoln Tenant's Panel.

The policy now referred to scheduled repairs where appropriate, and the repair responsibilities for both the City of Lincoln Council and Tenants had been updated.

The Repairs Policy aimed to identify within the provision of the Housing Act 1985 (amended) the tenants right to repair and identify the repairs that the City of Lincoln Council were responsible for, and those which tenants were responsible for within the terms and conditions of their tenancy agreement.

The policy also looked to provide key information on service delivery, information on services provided by City of Lincoln Council, and how to report a repair.

The key areas for clarification related to fencing, specifically our guidance on replacements and the tenants responsibility for maintaining installed fencing. Other key alterations included responsibility for ventilation to the property to be maintained and cleaning/clearing of air vents by our tenants.

53. Quarter 2 - 2023-24 Operational Performance Report

Purpose of the Report

To present an outturn summary of the Council's operational performance in quarter two of 2023/24.

Decision

- 1. That the achievements and challenges identified in the Quarter 2 2023/24 operational performance report be noted.
- 2. It be confirmed that the format of the performance report continued to meet requirements.

Alternative Options Considered and Rejected

None were considered.

Reasons for the Decision

Regular monitoring of the council's performance was a key component of the Local Performance Management Framework. This report covered the key strategic performance measures identified by members and Corporate Management Team (CMT) as of strategic importance.

The outturn summary report detailed performance against a total of 79 measures across the directorates Chief Executive's, Communities and Environment and Housing and Investment. In total 62 performance measures out of the 79 were monitored against targets, of which 12 were below target; 23 were within target boundaries; 27 had met or exceeded a higher target; 17 measures were recorded as volumetric and there were no measures recorded as data not available for this quarter.

Out of the 79 performance measures monitored during the quarter with 62 targets allocated to them, 50 (80.6%) were within or exceeding the targets set. This was an improvement of 8.9% when compared to quarter 1 2023/24.

A further 17 measures were volumetric and provided context to overall service delivery. Commentaries on each measure were detailed in the report.

The Quarter 2 2023/24 Operational Performance Report reported at Appendix A to the officer's report detailed those targeted measures with performance above or below target by directorate at the end of the second quarter of 2023/24, and the reasonings behind the performance outturns.

In addition to the directorate performance measures, the report also detailed the performance outturns for corporate performance measures. These measures focussed on areas of resources, health & wellbeing, sickness, complaints (including Ombudsman rulings) and compliments.

To support the full operational performance report, a full list of all performance measure outturns and supporting performance commentary was provided at Appendix B, together with those performance measures performing within target boundary at the end of the quarter (acceptable performance) and the outturns for all performance measures recorded as volumetric (untargeted)

54. Financial Performance - Quarterly Monitoring

Purpose of Report

To present the second quarter's performance (up to 30 September 2023) on the Council's General Fund, Housing Revenue Account, Housing Repairs Service and Capital Programmes, and to seek approval for changes to the capital programmes.

Decision

- 1. That the financial performance for the period 1 April 2023 to 30 September 2023 and the projected outturns for 2023/24 be noted.
- 2. That the underlying impact of the pressures and underspends identified in paragraphs 3.3 (and Appendix B), 4.3 (and Appendix D), and 5.2 (and Appendix F) of the officer's report be noted.
- 3. That the changes to the General Investment Programme and Housing Investment Programme as approved by the Chief Finance Officer detailed in paragraphs 7.5 and 7.12 of the officer's report be noted.

4. That the changes to the General Investment Programme and Housing Investment Programme, as detailed in paragraphs 7.4, 7.10 and 7.11 of the officer's report, be approved.

Alternative Options Considered and Rejected

None.

Reason for Decision

Financial Procedure Rules required members to receive, on a quarterly basis, a report prepared jointly by the Chief Finance Officer and Corporate Management Team commenting on financial performance to date. This report was designed to meet this requirement.

Whilst there were still a number of variables which were subject to a level of uncertainty, based on the latest set of assumptions as at the end of the second quarter (up to 30th September 2023), the forecast financial position of the Council for 2023/24 was detailed at paragraph 2.2 of the officer's report, together with the detailed financial position shown in sections 3-7 and the accompanying appendices.

Updates were reported as follows:

General Fund Revenue Account

For 2023/24 the Council's net General Fund revenue budget was set at £14,402,660 which included a planned contribution from balances of £191,110 resulting in an estimated level of general balances at the year-end of £2,228,739 (after allowing for the 2022/23 outturn position).

The General Fund Summary was currently projecting a forecast underspend of £117,659 (Appendix A provided a forecast General Fund Summary) resulting in general balances at the year-end of £2,346,398. This position maintained balances above the prudent minimum of c.£1.5-2m.

There were a number of forecast year-end variations in income and expenditure against the approved budget, as detailed at paragraphs 3.3-3.5 of the report, with the main variances provided in Appendix B to the report.

Whilst the level of uncertainty around inflation pressures was significantly reduced this year due to actions taken in the latest Medium Term Financial Strategy (MTFS), there still remained uncertainty in terms of service demands and income forecasts. At quarter two, the potential for further variances during the year remained high, and as such the final outturn position for the year was still subject to further change. At this stage though, there were no further mitigations recommended, however, as always, there would continue to be a need for strong budgetary control in this financial year to ensure expenditure and income remained balanced within the budget.

Towards Financial Sustainability Programme

The savings target included in the MTFS for 2023/24 was £185,210.

Progress against this target, based on quarter 2 performance, showed that secured savings totalled £115,510 for the General Fund, with a further £69,700 identified, which achieved the in-year target in full.

A summary of the specific reviews that had contributed to this delivery were shown in Appendix K.

Housing Revenue Account

For 2023/24 the Council's Housing Revenue Account (HRA) net revenue budget was set with a planned contribution from balances of £58,930, resulting in an estimated level of general balances at the year-end of £1,125,517, after allowing for the 2022/23 outturn position.

The HRA was currently projecting a forecast overspend of £28,999 which would result in HRA balances of £1,154,516 at the end of 2023/24. (Appendix C provided a forecast Housing Revenue Account Summary). This position maintained balances above the prudent minimum of circa £1m.

Although the forecast position was an underspend, there were a number of significant variations in income and expenditure against the approved budget as outlined at paragraph 4.3-4.5 of the report, with full details of the main variances provided in Appendix D of the report.

As detailed throughout this report, there still remained a number of variables in the forecast assumptions, and as such the final outturn position for the year was still subject to further change. At this stage no additional mitigations, other than those currently being implemented in response to the issues faced by the Housing Repairs Service (HRS) and in response to void levels, were recommended. Strong budgetary control should continue to be a focus in this financial year to ensure expenditure and income remained balanced within budget.

Housing Repairs Service

For 2023/24 the Council's Housing Repairs Service net revenue budget was set at zero, reflecting its full cost recovery nature.

At quarter 2 the HRS was forecasting a deficit of £761,406 in 2023/24 as detailed within the forecast HRS summary at Appendix E, with full details of the main variances provided in Appendix F, together with a summary of the key variances provided at paragraph 5.2 of the officer's report.

The main contributory factor for this deficit was the ongoing recruitment and retention challenges, which were being felt not just by the council but across the construction industry as a whole. This inability to attract and retain staff resulted in a greater reliance on the use of sub-contractors to ensure that service demands were met. The cost of using sub-contractors was however more expensive than the HRS's own workforce, due to the ongoing impact of Covid19, the current inflationary crisis and a reduced pool of contractors from which to secure services. These additional costs were therefore not fully offset by the vacancy savings achieved by not carrying out the work internally.

As the increased sub-contractor costs were not reflected in the service hourly rate and overhead recovery was not recouped on sub-contractors, this resulted in an under recovery of full costs from the HRA.

Whilst last year high vacancy levels, and the use of sub-contractors rather than our own workforce, resulted in an underspend on materials for the Council, this year higher than anticipated inflation levels, an industry wide issue, and an expected increase in repair jobs had resulted in an overspend on materials further compounding the HRS forecast position.

The forecast deficit also included the impact of the national pay award announced in November 2023, which was significantly over and above the assumptions included within the MTFS, as outlined in both the General Fund and HRA variances.

It should be noted that due to the interconnection of the HRS and HRA, the consequential costs in the HRA were ordinarily reduced, and therefore offset any repatriated deficit. However due to the increased usage of more expensive subcontractors and materials, and an increased volume of works, this was not the case this financial year as detailed above, and there was a significant additional cost for repairs and maintenance of the housing stock being incurred by the HRA. This additional cost was being offset against the overall HRA position.

Earmarked Reserves

The Council held a number of earmarked revenue reserves over both the General Fund and HRA. These reserves were sums set aside for specific purposes and to mitigate against potential future known or predicted liabilities. Key reserves included income volatility, business rates volatility, IT investment fund, asset sinking funds for future refurbishment etc. A number of these reserves were budgeted for use over the period of the MTFS.

The details of all the earmarked reserves and their forecast balance as at 31 March 2024 were attached at Appendix G, and summarised at paragraph 6.2 of the officer's report, with further details in the MTFS 2023-2028.

General Fund Investment Programme

The revised General Investment Programme (GIP) for 2023/24 amounted to £24.688m following the quarter 1 report. At quarter 2 the programme had increased by £0.096m to £24,784m, as detailed at paragraph 7.2 of the officer's report.

There were no changes over the approved limit which required approval by the Executive for the second quarter.

New projects added to the GIP, which required Executive approval were detailed at paragraph 7.4 of the officer's report.

The financial changes delegated to the Chief Finance Officer for approval for the second quarter 2023/2024 were detailed at paragraph 7.5, with a summary of the projected outturn position provided at paragraph 7.6 of the officer's report.

The overall spend on the General Investment Programme active schemes for the second quarter of 2023/24 was £4.4m, which was 22.6% of the 2022/23 budget

(excluding externally delivered schemes), as detailed further at Appendix I of the report.

Although this was a low percentage of expenditure at this stage of the financial year, further expenditure was expected in the next 6 months on Better Care Fund (DFG's), Western Growth Corridor, Greyfriars, Central Market and Town's Deal Schemes.

Housing Investment Programme

The revised Housing Investment Programme (HIP) for 2023/24 amounted to £17.969m following the quarter 1 position. At quarter 2 the programme had been decreased by £1.107m to £16.862m, as detailed within paragraph 7.9 of the officer's report.

All changes over the approved limit required approval by the Executive. There had been a number of changes made to the HIP as part of the ongoing work on the 30-year business plan to align the budgets to reflect planned acquisitions and scheduled works on the existing housing stock for the length of the MTFS. The financial changes over the approved limit which required Executive approval for the second quarter 2023/2024 were detailed at paragraph 7.10 of the officer's report.

All new projects were subject to Executive approval. There had been one new project to be funded from the Major Repairs Reserve which required approval during quarter 2 as detailed at paragraph 7.11 of the officers report.

The financial changes delegated to the Chief Finance Officer for approval as set out under Financial Procedure Rules for the second quarter 2023/2024 were detailed at paragraph 7.12 and a summary of the projected outturn position for the Housing Investment Programme at paragraph 7.13 of the officer's report.

The overall expenditure on the Housing Investment Programme at the end of quarter 2 of 2023/24 was £4.205m, which was 24.94% of the 2023/24 revised programme. This was detailed further at Appendix J.

A further £0.649m had been spent as at the end of October 2023. Although this was still a low percentage of expenditure at this stage of the financial year, works had been constrained by the availability of contractors and materials, however, new contracts were in place and spend was expected to increase in future periods. In addition, schemes such as Hermit Street and Western Growth Corridor had only recently commenced and a number of the LAHF acquisitions were currently in progress but not yet completed.

55. Statement of Accounts 2022/23

Purpose of Report

To present for information the final Statement of Accounts for the financial year ended 31 March 2023, following substantial completion of the audit opinion.

Decision

That following scrutiny of the statement of accounts for the financial year ended on 31 March 2023, the Statement of Accounts be recommended to Council on 28 November 2023 for approval.

Alternative Options Considered and Rejected

None.

Reasons for the Decision

The Statement of Accounts for 2022/23 provided a comprehensive picture of the Council's financial circumstances and had been compiled to demonstrate probity and stewardship of public funds.

The Council was statutorily required to publish its draft Statement of Accounts for 2022/23 by 31 May 2023 with an audit opinion and certificate by no later than 30 September 2023.

The Statement of Accounts for 2022/23 were still subject to verification by External Audit. The audit of the accounts was being finalised by Mazars, who commenced the audit in July 2023. The majority of the audit work had now been completed by Mazars, however, should any changes be necessary as a result of this final external work, these would be reported to the Chair of the Audit Committee with any material changes notified to the Audit Committee.

The Council made the statement of accounts available for public inspection for the required ten working days, between 1 June until 15 June 2023, during which time, the external auditor was available to answer questions, although none were received.

The Audit Completion Report also stated that there were no significant findings or recommendations in relation to internal controls during the completion of the audit work.

The Council was also required to provide a documental annual review of the effectiveness of its governance arrangements (Annual Governance Statement (AGS)), which sat alongside the Statement of Accounts; the overall level of assurance provided in 2022/23 was substantial (green) and was in line with the Council's Code of Corporate Governance.

Substantial progress had been made against the significant issue in relation to the IT Disaster Recovery Plan, that was included in the previous year's AGS, to the extent that the issue was no longer a significant governance issue. There were no new significant governance issues that were identified for inclusion in the 2022/23 Statement of Accounts.

56. <u>Treasury Management and Prudential Code Update - Mid-Year Report - Sept 2023</u>

Purpose of Report

To report the Council's treasury management activity and the actual prudential indicators for the period 1 April 2023 to 30 September 2023, in accordance with the requirements of the Chartered Institute of Public Finance and Accountancy (CIPFA) Code of Practice.

Decision

That the Prudential and Local Indicators and the actual performance against the Treasury Management Strategy 2023/24 for the half-year ended 30 September 2023 be noted.

Alternative Options Considered and Rejected

None.

Reason for Decision

The prudential system for capital expenditure was well established. One of the requirements of the Prudential Code was to ensure adequate monitoring of the capital expenditure plans, prudential indicators (PIs) and treasury management response to these plans. The report fulfilled that requirement and included a review of compliance with Treasury and Prudential Limits and the Prudential Indicators at 30th September 2023. The Treasury Management Strategy and Prudential Indicators were previously reported to and approved by Council on 28th February 2023.

It was noted that the Council held £41.145 million of investments at 30 September 2023, with the full investment profile set out at Appendix A of the report. Of this investment portfolio, 100% was held in low risk specified investments, the requirement for the year being a minimum of 25% of the portfolio to be specified investments. During the six months to 30 September on average 93% of the portfolio was held in low risk specified investments and an average of 7% of the portfolio was held in non-specified investments with other local authorities.

It was noted that as at 30th September 2023, the Council held £114.353m of external borrowing, of which 100% were fixed rate loans (Appendix A referred).

As at 30th September 2023, the average rate of interest paid during the first half of the financial year on external borrowing was 3.14%. This was lower than the budgeted rate set in the MTFS 2022-27 of 4.25%. There had been a reduction in external borrowing during the first 6 months of the year as some borrowing has been repaid and internal balances used to fund expenditure.

This Council had adopted the CIPFA Code of Practice for Treasury Management in the Public Sector and operated its treasury management service in compliance with this Code and the above requirements. These required that the prime objective of treasury management activity was the effective management of risk, and that its borrowing activities were undertaken in a prudent, affordable and sustainable basis.

This report highlighted the changes to the key prudential indicators, to enable an overview of the current status of the capital expenditure plans. It incorporated any new or revised schemes previously reported to members. Changes required to the residual prudential indicators and other related treasury management issues were also included.

57. Health, Safety and Welfare Policy 2023

Purpose of Report

To present the Council's revised Health, Safety and Welfare Policy to the Executive.

Decision

That the Health, Safety and Welfare Policy June 2023 be approved.

Alternative Options Considered or Rejected

None.

Reason for Decision

The Council's Health, Safety and Welfare Policy had been reviewed and consulted upon and, subject to being approved at this meeting, would supersede the existing policy approved in July 2019.

The document was one of the essential building blocks in contributing to an effective and successful health and safety management system, comprising four sections setting out responsibilities for health and safety across the organisation and arrangements in place to manage health and safety.

The Health and Safety Welfare Policy comprised four sections:

- Section One General Policy Statement.
- Section Two Organisation for Health and Safety. Health and Safety
- Section Three Arrangements for Health and Safety.
- Section Four Monitoring and Review of the Health and Safety Policy.

Revisions to the policy were detailed within paragraphs 2.5 - 2.9 of the officer's report.

The Tree of Responsibility incorporated a colour coded system, intended to assist all individuals to identify their health and safety duties and responsibilities. It was recommended within the Policy that this colour coded system be applied to each Directorate's organisational structure chart to enable all individuals within the Council to hold clarity as to their own health duties and responsibilities.

A copy of the final draft of the Health, Safety and Welfare Policy, incorporating the proposed amendments, was appended to the report. Also appended to the report was an extract of the minutes from the meeting of the City of Lincoln Council and Employee Joint Consultative (Health, Safety and Welfare) Committee held on 3 October 2023 which recommended approval of the proposed changes.

58. HR Policy Change: Management of Change

Purpose of Report

To provide Executive with an overview of the proposed changes to the Council's Management of Change Policy, and request that the revised policy be formally approved.

Decision

That the changes to the Councils Management of Change Policy be approved.

Alternative Options Considered or Rejected

None.

Reason for Decision

Recently Human Resources (HR) had reviewed the Management of Change Policy in conjunction with Trade Unions A summary of the proposed changes was detailed at paragraph 3.1of the officer's report.

The proposed changes had been discussed with Unions during local HR and Trade Union meetings, and Unions were supportive of the changes.

This Policy was also taken to Joint Consultative Council (JCC) in October 2023, where it was agreed that the proposed changes should progress to Executive for consideration/formal approval.

59. Strategic Risk Register- Quarterly Review

Purpose of Report

To provide a status report on the revised Strategic Risk Register as at the end of the second quarter 2023/24.

Decision

That the Council's strategic risks as at the end of quarter 2 2023/24, be noted.

Alternative Options Considered and Rejected

None were considered. The Strategic Risk Register contained the key strategic risks to the delivery of the Council's medium and longer term priorities. A failure to monitor the action that was being taken to manage those risks would undermine the Council's governance arrangements.

Reasons for the Decision

An update of the Strategic Risk Register developed under the risk management approach of 'risk appetite', was last presented Members in August 2023 and contained fourteen strategic risks as detailed within paragraph 3.1 of the officer's report.

Since reporting to Members in August, the Strategic Risk Register had been refreshed and updated by the Risk Owners and Corporate Management Team which had identified some positive movement in the Risk Register.

The updated register was contained with Part B of this agenda, it contained fourteen strategic risks along with details of relevant mitigations.

The fourteen risks identified were detailed within paragraph 3.1 of the officer's report.

Each risk included a number of control measures in order to avoid, seek, modify, transfer or retain the risks. These included actions already in place and further actions required with the relevant timescales for implementation. These control actions continued to be implemented and the risks managed accordingly.

Each risk was evaluated in terms of the level of assessed risk (likelihood and impact), taking into consideration any changes in control measures and the wider environment in which the Council operated. While there had been some positive movements in terms of the implementation of control measures, this had resulted in there not being any change to the assessed level or likelihood of any of the risks.

The assessed level of each of the fourteen risks was outlined at paragraph 3.4 of the officer's report.

The refreshed register would be performance monitored on a quarterly basisand reported to both Performance Scrutiny Committee and Executive.



1. Purpose of Report

1.1 To recommend to Executive the transfer of legal title to Lincolnshire County Council's Heritage Services that proportion of the artefacts currently within the City Council's ownership that do not have a direct relationship with the City itself. This element finalises the pre-existing agreement in relation to the ongoing operation of the Usher Art Gallery together with the safe storage, conservation and display of the city council's art and artefacts. The proposals have been developed following extensive further negotiations with Lincolnshire County Council.

2. Background

- 2.1 Members will recall the lengthy and complex negotiations with Lincolnshire County Council (LCC) over a three-year period to secure the future of the Usher Gallery as an art gallery. This culminated in a report to this committee on 25th August 2021 which led to the approval of three agreements:
 - A lease variation for the Usher Gallery, enabling wider use of the building by LCC in limited circumstances and introducing the option of a break clause to the lease after 20 years (31st March 2042)
 - A service level agreement defining the hours and days of operation of the gallery, the role and financial support of the city council, and overall principles for the management of the city council's art and artefacts (including transfer of title for some artefacts) a rolling agreement with a review point after three years (March 2025) and every two years thereafter.
 - A detailed collections management agreement detailing how the collections themselves will be looked after by Lincolnshire County Council (LCC).
- 2.2 The substantial collection of art owned by the City Council is excluded from the agreement to transfer title to the County Council. Also, in term of artefacts in the City Council's ownership, the wider collection related to world cultures is likewise excluded. Therefore, this report focuses on artefacts within three broad categories:
 - Archaeology (within Lincolnshire)
 - Natural History
 - Geology
- 2.3 Prior to April 1974, Lincoln County Borough Council owned and operated the City and County Museum and the Usher Gallery. Through local government reorganisation

under the Local Government Act 1972, ownership of the buildings and all collections passed to the City Council. On 24th October 1974, the City Council resolved to appoint the County Council as its agent under s.101 of the Local Government Act 1972 for the operation of the City and County Museum and the Usher Gallery, and the service has operated in this way since, until revised terms were negotiated in November 2021. This report covers the element of those revised terms relating to the transfer of defined artefacts in the City Council's ownership to Lincolnshire County Council.

2.4 Members should note that as part of the revised agreement, the County Council make no charge for storing, conserving and curating the City Council's material to national standards. This represents a significant cost saving to the City Council, which has in total over 24,000 pieces of art and artefacts.

It should also be noted that post 1974, the County Council has become the accession body for all such material. Therefore, for some collections ownership is split between the City Council (pre 1974 donations) and LCC (all post 1974 donations).

3. Items Identified for Transfer of Title to Lincolnshire County Council

- 3.1 In essence, the agreement reached in November 2021 included provision for the City Council to transfer ownership of its archaeological material drawn from the wider county area (but not within Lincoln itself) to the County Council at nil cost. The material discovered within the City is to remain in City Council ownership. Appendix A reproduces an extract (minute 28) of Executive Committee minutes for 25th August 2021 as they relate to this part of the agreement.
- 3.2 **Appendix B** reproduces in full a report from Lincolnshire County Council detailing the principles for the transfer of title at no cost, to their Heritage Service. It covers the history related to the artefacts and from where they originated. The report also goes onto confirm that:

"The County Council is the relevant body for receipt of proposed collection transfers as the Arts Council England accredited museum body for Lincoln Museum and The Usher Gallery. Under prior and existing arrangements for Lincoln Museum, The Usher Gallery and their associated collections, Lincolnshire County Council has demonstrated a long-term commitment to the provision of collections management, care, and access for City Council owned collections."

"All proposed transfers are made with a view to maintaining or improving the overall curatorial integrity of the collections and not for any other purpose. No transfer is proposed that would be to the detriment of the collections and is made with the curatorial recommendation of the County Council's team of qualified museum professionals."

- 3.3 The following categories of items are the agreed priorities for the period 2021-2025 for review and transfer of title to the County Council:
 - Natural History
 - Geology
 - Archaeology (British)

The LCC report covers the transfer of the Natural History and Geology collections, and the first batch of items within the Archaeology collection where it is clear they meet the agreed criteria for transfer. The remaining items within the archaeology category will need further work before coming forward for transfer, or not.

3.4 In summary the proposal from LCC is:

- Geology and Natural History Collections: wholesale transfer, as many of the deposits originate from several historical donors covering a wide geographical area, many deposited pre 1974. Therefore, splitting current legal ownership between two councils would not be in the best interests of these collections. The wider benefits of wholesale transfer of these collections to the County Council will allow these complex, specialist collections to be better reviewed and developed, as a whole, representative of the County and within the single title of the County Council's museum collection. This would present a stronger proposition for funding and collaborating with partners to undertake specialist research and review work in order to better understand these collections for the benefit of our shared audiences and communities.
- Archaeology (British): The recommendation is to permanently transfer the
 title of British Archaeological material from the City Council to the County
 Council where the physical provenance of items/collections sits outside of the
 current geographical jurisdiction of the City of Lincoln Council. Transfer of these
 collections to the County Council will provide improved coherence of these
 collections within a single heritage entity- and go some way to reducing the
 artificial split of the collection by date (i.e. by the 1974 local authority division).
- 3.5 The archaeology work is not yet complete. Further reports for the transfer of other archaeological material will follow later for the more complex artefacts that require further investigation. In some cases, these will need to be considered through case-by-case proposal and agreement with the city council. Future reports will include items where it is not possible to readily apply the geographical principle in a straightforward manner.

4. City Council's Review of the Proposal

- 4.1 Officers in the Heritage Service at LCC have adhered to the categories that were as agreed, and restricted the review to archaeological objects found in Lincolnshire outside the present City boundary but otherwise within the UK. The City Council will therefore retain ownership and ultimate responsibility for objects found in Lincoln and for the world cultures material.
- 4.2 From an archaeological perspective the chief value of the objects proposed for transfer lies in what story they can tell about the past. This value is enhanced by their relationship to any other objects that have been found nearby, very many more of which have been found in wider Lincolnshire since the 1974 cutoff. It is therefore considered more beneficial for the items listed for transfer to be in the same ownership under LCC.
- 4.3 With regard to the geology and natural history collections, their scientific value is far greater as a unified collection rather than being split according to an arbitrary date of acquisition in 1974.

- 4.4 The full list of objects to transfer run to 794 pages of individual listing, broken down by:
 - Archaeology 25 pages of items
 - Geology 238 pages of items
 - Natural History 531 pages of items

As these are very detailed listings, a 10-page random sample extract has been taken from each listing to provide an illustration of the type of material to be transferred. These are reproduced in **Appendix C to E**.

5. Strategic Priorities

5.1 Let's Drive Economic Growth

Heritage and culture are significant drivers of tourism, which itself is a vital element of the local economy. The City needs to maintain a vibrant heritage offer to drive year-round tourism. This transfer of objects supports the overarching agreement with LCC on the delivery of museum and gallery services within the City.

5.2 Financial Implications

Noting the background section to this report, the transfer of material to LCC forms part of a wider agreement with LCC for the long term maintenance of the Usher Gallery. Taking each category of object in turn:

- Archaeology (British) No individual item is likely to have a significant value, but if certain objects were to sell (for example) an individual Roman brooch or Saxon cremation urn, it might expect to fetch between £100-£300 depending on its condition. Fragmentary examples will fetch a great deal less. Balanced against this rather minimal (in comparative terms) monetary value, there is the significant potential cost of providing storage and conservation of these items if they were ever to revert to the care of the city council.
- Geology and Natural History: there may well be objects in the geology collection that have some financial value, particularly some of the more eye-catching fossils such as the plesiosaur vertebrae and paddles, but the vast majority of objects are mineral and rock samples that are worthless in monetary terms but constitute a clear liability in terms of the large amount of storage space they require. Some are even toxic, and require specialist handling and care. The natural history collection is even more problematic, as the preserved animals, preserved skins and insect specimens require constant environmental and pest-control monitoring and have recently been subject to extensive conservation works undertaken by the County Council at their own expense.

The transfer of material is at nil cost to the City Council.

5.3 Whilst the above confirms a potential notional value for the items being transferred, there are two further aspects to consider.

- a) The City Council will still retain ownership of the much higher value collections covering arts and crafts and also the international collection pieces. These have not formed part of the agreement with LCC to explore transfer of title, so will remain with the City Council.
- b) It is very difficult for the County Council to realise any value in the objects to be transferred while they remain a Museums Association accredited organisation. Any decision to dispose of objects must be taken according to a clear framework published by the Museums Association (MA), which states that the removal of an item from a museum collection must be motivated solely by the interests of the item itself and of the wider collection, and must not be undertaken primarily for financial gain. The MA's disposal toolkit makes it clear that the first option to consider is the transfer of an item to another accredited museum or public sector body, then if that proves impossible it should be returned to the original donor. At the end of the process, after all other options have been exhausted, it might be acceptable to sell the object. The MA guidance also says that any proceeds from a sale must "be applied solely and directly for the benefit of the museum's collection" so it would not be possible for the County Council to sell the items transferred and use the money for general purposes.

5.4 Legal Implications

Legal title to the objects as listed would transfer to the County Council in accordance with all statutory guidance and good practice relating to museum objects.

5.5 **Procurement Implications**

There are no procurement implications – this is a straight froward transfer of legal title.

5.6 Equality, Diversity and Human Rights

The Public Sector Equality Duty means that the Council must consider all individuals when carrying out their day-to-day work, in shaping policy, delivering services and in relation to their own employees.

It requires that public bodies have due regard to the need to:

- Eliminate discrimination
- Advance equality of opportunity
- Foster good relations between different people when carrying out their activities

The transfer of title will not result in any negative impact on the City Council's Equality Duty and may enhance wider access to the material once under the control of a single organisation.

5.7 Land, Property and Accommodation

The contents of this report comply with the agreement referenced earlier in the report covering the wider lease for the Usher Gallery and Service Level agreement for its operation and additional curation of the City Council's art and artefacts.

5.8 Significant Community Impact

The transfer of title will not result in any negative impact on the local community or the many special interest groups, researchers or academics. It may enhance access to the material once under the control of a single organisation.

6. Conclusion

6.1 The overall view is that this is positive for both the City and County Councils, and is the right approach with regard to the correct curation of these collections. For those collections not forming part of this agreement, they are retained by the Council, and hence remain the ultimate owner of the materials found in Lincoln or given specifically to the City, and the City Council will continue to have the ultimate say over their care. For the rest of the items/collections, these would move into the ownership of LCC, an accredited body committed to looking after them.

Purpose of Report

To confirm to Executive the finalised proposals in relation to the ongoing operation of the Usher Art Gallery together with the safe storage, conservation and display of the city council's art and artefacts. The proposals had been developed following extensive further negotiations with Lincolnshire County Council and a range of external stakeholders.

<u>Decision</u>

- (1) That the proposed agreement negotiated with Lincolnshire County Council, as detailed in the report, be approved.

Alternative Options Considered and Rejected

Extensive negotiations had been ongoing over the last three years with Lincolnshire County Council in attempts to secure the future of the Usher Gallery

as an art gallery. Alternative options had previously been explored by the Executive.

Reasons for the Decision

Senior officers of the City Council had negotiated extensively with Lincolnshire County Council over several years to secure the future of the Usher Art Gallery as an art gallery.

At a meeting on 18 June 2021 an outline proposal was agreed in principle by both councils over the future operation of the Usher Art Gallery, as set out in sections 3 and 4 of the report, subject to the signing of the detailed supporting legal agreements.

These proposals had the full support of a range of stakeholders including: the Historic Lincoln Trust, led by Lord Cormack; Usher Gallery Trust; and Save Lincoln Usher Gallery, a high-profile pressure group established to campaign for the retention of the Usher Art Gallery as an art gallery.

The full negotiated position for the Usher Gallery and the storage and care of the City Council's art and artefacts was set out on pages 18 and 19 of the agenda pack. However, it was highlighted that the negotiated positions involved a lease to the County Council for the Usher Gallery to remain open as an art gallery on average five days a week and for storage and care of the City Council's large collection of art and artefacts.

Both councils were to explore external funding bids to invest in transforming The Collection Museum building and Usher Gallery to create a sense of one location across the two sites.

The only financial implication for the City Council associated with the new agreements related to the cost of operating the Usher Gallery for two additional days per week throughout the year. The final cost would be negotiated by the Director of Communities and Environment within the budget provision already allocated in the Medium Term Financial Strategy for the Usher Gallery.



1. Arrangements for Collections Management:

Prior to April 1974 Lincoln County Borough Council owned and operated a museum called the City and County Museum and an art gallery known as the Usher Gallery pursuant to its powers under the Public Libraries and Museums Act 1964. Under and by virtue of the Local Government Act 1972 and certain Orders made thereunder the City Council was constituted as the district council for the City of Lincoln and property in the City and County Museum and the Usher Gallery buildings and the collections housed therein passed to the City Council.

On 26 November 1973 the City Council resolved to approve proposals put forward by the County Council for a County Museums Service for Lincolnshire including the operation of the City and County Museum and the Usher Gallery by the County Council from 1 April 1974 subject to certain conditions. This included the retention in the City Council's ownership of the museum and art gallery buildings and the collections then housed therein. Since 24 October 1974, the City Council resolved to appoint the County Council as its agent under s 101 of the Local Government Act 1972 for the operation of the City and County Museum and the Usher Gallery. Today this operates as Lincoln Museum and The Usher Gallery.

In November 2021 the City Council and the County Council agreed revised terms and conditions in order that the County Council shall act as the provider of collections management services in relation to those items in the collections of the Usher Gallery and Lincoln Museum (The Collection Museum, formerly the City and County Museum) that are the property of the City of Lincoln Council.

2. <u>Description of the Collection</u>

The City Council collections accessioned into the Usher Gallery collection or The Lincoln Museum (The Collection Museum / City and County Museum) collection on or before 31 March 1974 cover a broad range of material types and subject matter.

The collections were formed from several substantial private collections including, but not exclusive to the Lincoln Cathedral Dean and Chapter, the Trollope bequest, the Melville bequest, the Carlbom collection, the Smith collection, the Lincolnshire Naturalists' Union collection, the James Ward Usher bequest and the Sir Francis Hill collection, and subsequently developed through smaller bequests, systematic fieldwork (e.g., excavation and surface survey), donation and purchase.

The collections include specimens from the natural world spanning millions of years, and art and artefacts from the earliest human settlers in the county around 300,000 years ago to the first three quarters of the 20th Century. They incorporate specimens, art and artefacts:

- created, deposited, discovered or collected in the county of Lincolnshire.
- collected by Lincolnshire residents from the UK, or from other countries.
- presented to the museum and gallery collections as significant examples of their kind but with no connection to the county.

The breadth and depth of the collections cared for by the County Council enable stories of Lincolnshire to be told through evidence left behind by those that have lived here before, in their daily lives, their ways of earning a living, and their artistic endeavors; and those that have travelled from Lincolnshire

and collected art and artefacts from further afield in the UK and abroad, or presented art and artefacts of significance beyond the boundaries of the county of Lincolnshire.

The County Council's museum sites and associated collections in its care are accredited by Arts Council England under its Museum Accreditation scheme.

3. Public Benefit

The City Council license the use of items in the City Council collections to the County Council for the purpose of audience access and engagement in line with the strategic objectives of the County Council's Culture Service delivered via County Council managed sites, services, and programming.

The County Council's vision for heritage is to showcase Lincolnshire's rich heritage to the world, with a commitment to connect people and places onsite, online and within local communities by:

- Sharing stories that inspire through engagement with our sites and collections.
- Creating experiences that put our visitors and customers at the heart of all we do.
- Bringing history to life through experiences that ignite the imagination, delight, and entertain.
- Valuing our sites and collections so that they can be enjoyed now and by future generations.
- Caring for our sites and collections and making them accessible for all.

The collections in the care of the County Council contribute significantly to the County Council's Mission by bringing a wealth of enjoyment and engagement opportunities which further helps fulfil the commercial sustainability of its heritage sites.

The service helps to ensure the cultural heritage and life of the county and the country are preserved for future generations, and that the present population can access culture and heritage in a relevant way which contributes to the local visitor economy and place making agenda.

The County Council's portfolio of sites includes Lincoln Castle, Lincoln Museum, The Usher Gallery, Discover Stamford, Museum of Lincolnshire Life, Battle of Britain Memorial Flight Visitor Centre, as well as outreach within our communities and online.

Under the County Council's management Lincoln Museum and The Usher Gallery have recently been awarded Visit England's Welcome Accolade, recognising their excellence within the visitor attraction sector and showcasing the county's rich archaeology and art as a venue that goes the extra mile to provide a high-quality day out. The service's associated learning programme has been awarded the Sandford Award in recognition of its outstanding offer.

In 2022-23 the breadth of public engagement delivered by the County Council's Culture service resulted in over 894,000 physical visits to its sites, including 89,353 visits to Lincoln Museum and The Usher Gallery, 16,917 pupils from educational settings, and over 2.8million online interactions. Over 6,400 enquiries were responded to specifically in relation to the service's collections and archives.

4. Transfer of Collections

Within the Collections Management Agreement and accompanying Service Level Agreement the City Council and County Council agreed to seek to review items in the City Council collections where they hold a provenance outside of the current geographical remit and jurisdiction of the City Council. This review is with the intention of exploring the permanent transfer of title for relevant artefacts from the City Council to the County Council as the appropriate accredited body- for their incorporation into the County Council museum collections.

The County Council is the relevant body for receipt of proposed collection transfers as the Arts Council England accredited museum body for Lincoln Museum and The Usher Gallery. Under prior and existing arrangements for Lincoln Museum, The Usher Gallery and their associated collections, Lincolnshire County Council has demonstrated a long-term commitment to the provision of collections management, care, and access for City Council owned collections.

All proposed transfers are made with a view to maintaining or improving the overall curatorial integrity of the collections and not for any other purpose. No transfer is proposed that would be to the detriment of the collections and is made with the curatorial recommendation of the County Council's team of qualified museum professionals. Transfer of title requires the prior agreement of the City Council to approve transfer of title, and the acceptance by the County Council in accordance with the collecting criteria of its Collections Development Policy. Transfers will be undertaken at nil cost to the City of Lincoln Council. The transfer of the material in scope provides for both the future security of the artefacts within the museum collection, and security for the City of Lincoln Council in the event of future changes to the current Collections Management Agreement.

The Service Level Agreement accompanying the Collections Management Agreement records the agreement of the Parties with regards to the priorities and any exclusions in force for the review of the City Council collections. The following categories of items are the agreed priorities for the period 2021-2025 for review and transfer of title to the County Council:

- Natural History
- Geology
- Archaeology (British)

This report serves to address the transfer of the Natural History and Geology collections, and the first batch of items within the Archaeology collection.

4.1 Geology and Natural History Collections

4.1.1 Proposal:

The recommendation is made for the wholesale transfer of the City Council owned Geology and Natural History collections from the City Council to the County Council.

In both categories a significant proportion of these collections come from historic/antiquarian collectors, with large deposits made by several key individual donors representing a range of geographical areas sometimes working as a group.

Significant wider geological and natural history collections are held by the County Council, sometimes involving the same donors across the 1974 date divide in collections ownership. Therefore the transfer of the collection will strengthen its integrity by being brought into a single legal ownership.

Groups of specimens donated together would be split further if geographic variables are applied. In addition, for large proportions of both natural history and geology collections, documentation relating to the identification of and exact provenance for individual items is minimal. As such, there is a notable degree of uncertainty as to the exact origins of some of the items within these collections in terms of geographical location – although an educated prediction would be that the majority of these items are not from the area defined as within City of Lincoln Council jurisdiction. Therefore, in order to best uphold the integrity of the collections for future research and interpretation wholesale transfer is recommended to avoid a further artificial split of these collections by geographical boundary.

Furthermore, due to the historic detachment of identification labels from individual items; incorrect identification in the documentation; and no inventory having been created in March 1974 without specialist input, it is impossible to match up all the physical items with the available documentation. In addition, pre 1974 some rationalisation of natural history is understood to have taken place due to the condition of the items which is not always documented to individual object level. Wholesale transfer will support the County Council's ongoing management of these collections in their entirety to resolve these issues. This will better allow for the alleviation of discrepancies and for the collection's ongoing management in line with sector standards for good collections practice.

The wider benefits of wholesale transfer of these collections to the County Council in the longer term will allow these complex, specialist collections to be better reviewed and developed, as a whole, representative of the County and within the single title of the County Council's museum collection. This would present a stronger proposition for funding and collaborating with partners to undertake specialist research and review work in order to better understand these collections for the benefit of our shared audiences and communities.

4.1.2 Documentation to support transfer.

A digitised extract of accession register entries provides information as to records of natural history and geology collected between 1906 and 31 March 1974. Headings include accession number, object name, description, and location (findspot/collection spot) where this information is recorded and available.

Please note one record may equate to more than one physical item. Therefore, totals relate to number of records for items to be transferred.

For these categories, the digitised extract comprises the full list of items in scope for transfer of title.

Copies of the relevant hardcopy accession registers held by the museum have been created and entries for each category proposed for transfer highlighted. The original accession registers will be

annotated to update transfer of title (subject to this being agreed). The original ledgers are available for City Council inspection upon request.

4.2 Archaeology (British)

4.2.1 Proposal:

The recommendation is made to permanently transfer the title of British Archaeological material from the City Council to the County Council where the physical provenance of items/collections sits outside of the current geographical jurisdiction of the City of Lincoln Council.

Unlike natural history and geology, providing find spot data is available, archaeological collections largely support application of a straightforward geographical specification for transfer given their provenance from specific areas/locations.

The transfer will provide improved accountability for the City Council, in that the title of collections held by the City Council represent the current jurisdiction as relevant to its current electorate.

Transfer of these collections to the County Council will provide improved coherence of these collections within a single heritage entity- and go someway to reducing the artificial split of the collection by date (i.e., by 1974 local authority division).

The archaeological record of the county continues to evolve and is collected at county level by the County Council at Lincoln Museum as the place of deposit for archaeological archives. The museum's archaeological collection is recognised for its significance at national and international level. The transfer of title for non-City of Lincoln originating material to the County Council will result in permanent union of the transferred material with the wider archaeological record in the care of the County Council. This will maintain the format under which this collection has been collectively managed and developed since 1974.

Items where a straightforward application of geographical boundary is possible are brought forward within this initial report.

Further reports for the transfer of archaeological material by geographical location will follow where more complex queries require further investigation. In some cases, these will need to be considered through case-by-case proposal and agreement. Future reports will include items where it is not possible to readily apply the geographical principle in a straightforward manner, e.g.:

- Items where find spot data/ geographical location is not readily available via accession register entries and requires further examination by museum officers to assign find spot information.
- Items where location provenance is undeterminable following research.
- Items within early accession registers entries which are:
 - detailed by material type rather than category i.e., glass, pottery rather than archaeology which in some cases will require physical inspection of items to cross reference and define a specific archaeology category.

- detailed under a redundant category type e.g., by-gones, and/or which may be undated which require physical inspection of items to cross reference against the application of a 1750 cutoff date of archaeology.
- Items on 'permanent loan', 'undefined loan', or other historic basis for their holding by the museum which are not recognised within contemporary sector guidance, and which require appropriate conversion.
- Groups of items or archives where:
 - o accession dates span across 1974 title dates and where a major part of a collection sits within the County Council's owned museum collection.
 - provenance spans the defined geographical boundary where there is a case to discuss transfer to ensure permanent integrity of closely related collections.
 - These points are particularly relevant where this would lead to missed opportunities for new identifications, or even reuniting parts of an object based on items remaining in two separately owned collections.

4.2.2 Documentation to support transfer.

A digitised extract of accession register entries provides a first batch of information as to records of British archaeology collected between 1906 and 31 March 1974 where the geographical boundary criteria (current City of Lincoln Council jurisdiction) have been readily available and applied. For the purposes of this first report this focuses on records of archaeology collected between 1954 and 1974, with remaining material to follow in a subsequent report. The digitised extract includes accession number, object name, description, and location (findspot/collection spot) where this information is recorded.


Please note one record may equate to more than one physical item. Therefore, totals relate to number of records for items to be transferred.

For the City of Lincoln Council to approve the permanent transfer of title for the detailed museum artefacts from The City of Lincoln Council to Lincolnshire County Council for incorporation into the museum collection.
